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

- 4. In the event of a tie in points, the winner shall be the family with the greatest number of first places, and in the event of dispute, the decision of the Directors shall be final.



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Fair Rules and Regulations

- 1. The rules and regulations of the Carp Agricultural Society are established by the Board of Directors, are administered by the board, and may be changed by the board.
- Stock and all articles for competition or exhibition must be entered in the name of the
 registered owners, and unless this rule is observed, no premium shall be awarded, and if
 awarded, shall be withheld. Any exhibitor found guilty of the above irregularities will,
 forfeit all prizes won at the exhibition.
- 3. No animal shall be allowed to compete as purebred unless it possesses regular Stud or Herd Book Pedigree, a certified copy which must be presents to the directors in charge.
- 4. No person shall act as judge for awarding prizes for the class in which they or any member of their family is a competitor. The judge's decision shall be final, and anyone found abusing judges will forfeit all claims to prizes and may be debarred from exhibiting.
- 5. No animal hereditary unsound is to be awarded a premium. Any animals affected by contagious or infectious disease of suspected of same, may be removed at the discretion of the directors.
- 6. No person shall be allowed to enter for exhibition more than one specimen in any section of a class; this rule is to Field Crops, Grain & Seeds, Fruits & Vegetables, Maple Syrup, Honey, Flowers, Culinary Science, Juniors, Sewing, Needlework & Crafts, Women's Institute, Home Brewing Wine & Beer, Egg and Antiques and Collectibles departments.
- 7. Under the terms and conditions of the Livestock Classification established by Agriculture Canada, exhibitors of purebred Beef and Dairy Cattle, purebred Sheep, purebred Goats, and purebred Heavy Horses, are limited as to the number of entries. It shall be the responsibility of exhibitors to check the various departments in the prize list for details. In each case, where the same or common interests are involved in more than one breeding operation, such operators are considered as one breeding unit. All entries must be owned by the registered in the name of the exhibitor.
- 8. Exhibitors of Light and Heavy Horse may make up (2) two entries per class entries where specified under the Hayes Classification. The Light and Heavy Horse Committees may, at their discretion, limit the total number of entries that will be accepted per class, such limits to be published in the current prize list.
- 9. Entries of any exhibitor in any department may be refused in the case of an exhibitor who has shown an objectionable attitude or who has acted in an unsportsmanlike manner at a show.
- 10. Any article or animal enumerated in the list, if it is the only one of the kind on exhibition, will be judged accordingly, and any animal for which a prize has been awarded may be entered for prizes at any subsequent exhibition if the owner thereof wishes.
- 11. Any animal not shown in its proper class may be ruled out by the judge but will be allowed to compete in its correct class after reporting same to the director in charge.
- 12. Any member who shall impose, or attempt to impose any false representations, in any way, to obtain a premium or to take an advantage, or if any judge shall show partiality, shall be liable to be deprived of their premium, or to be expelled from the Society as the directors may think fit.
- 13. While directors may take every possible precaution under the circumstance to ensure the safety of the articles sent to the exhibition yet they wish it to be distinctly understood that the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting them, and should any articles be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the directors will give all the assistance in their power towards repairing or recovering the same, but make no payment of value thereof.
- 14. All articles and produce for competition in homecraft department shall be entered and in place by 9:30am the Thursday preceding the Fair. Judging shall commence at 10:00am.

Fair Rules and Regulations Continued

- 15. Exhibitors are urged to consult the directors of each department to ensure that their entries reach the C.A.S office by the closing date. Entry fees, when required, must accompany the entry form.
- 16. Should the income of the Society be insufficient to pay all prizes in full, the Society only binds itself to pay as much pro rata of prize money as is inconsistent with the receipts.
- 17. The Carp Agricultural Society will not be held responsible for any accidents occurring to its patrons on the fair grounds during the fair or at any other time.
- 18. Each exhibitor will receive prize money as awarded from the General Manager and any errors or omissions should be reported to him or her immediately.
- 19. All cheques issued by the General Manager must be presented at a bank for payment on or before December 15th of the current year, or prize money will be forfeited to the Society.
- 20. Exhibitors of articles in the Homecraft Sections will be allowed to remove their exhibits between 5:30pm and 6:00pm on the Sunday of the fair. All articles left after 6:00pm must be claimed in their respective building before 8:30am on the Monday after the fair.
- 21. Any exhibitor lodging a protest must do so in writing. This protest must be received by the Carp Agricultural Society office no later than 48 hours after the last day of the fair. It must be accompanied by a deposit of \$5.00 which will be forfeited to the Society if the said protest is not sustained. (The deposit will be \$25.00 for all horse, cattle, and sheep classes.) The Presidents and two Vice-Presidents shall constitute a committee to determine such protest.
- 22. Any person who shall attempt to interfere with the judges, directors or officers of the Society, or who shall on the premises use an contemptuous or abusive language to any judge, director or officers shall forfeit their rights to any premiums to which they maybe entitled and shall be excluded from exhibiting for one or more years, thereafter at the discretion of the directors. Such a person may also, at the discretion of the directors, be immediately removed from the grounds for the duration of the fair.
- 23. Exhibitor's passes will be awarded according to the following schedule:
 - Horse: Animals 1 Weekend Pass per animal
 - Cattle: 1- 4 Animals- 1 Day Pass- Each additional 4 animals- 1 Day Pass
 - Sheep: 1-8 Animals-1 Day Pass- Each additional 8 animals-1 Day Pass
 - Goats: 1-8 Animals- 1 Day Pass- Each additional 8 animals- 1 Day Pass
 - Homecraft Less than 10 articles exhibited, 1 day pass. 10 articles or more, 1 weekend pass.
- 24. The board of directors reserves the right to correct any errors in this book.
- 25. You must be a member of the society to register for any of the livestock or homecraft exhibitions. This \$10 membership will apply upon entering for those 18 years of age and older.

IMPORTANT TO EXHIBITORS:

- 1. Ages of all horses and foals will be reckoned from January 1st of the current year.
- 2. Only Original Certificates of Registration will be accepted for horses entered in classes that are designated "registered". Prize money won in these classes will not be paid until all Certificates of Registration are presented to the Carp Fair Office.
- 3. Any driven entry must have another capable driver only with them. Under no circumstances are there to be other persons inside the ring while judging is taking place, except officials, judges and handlers.
- 4. Under no circumstances No riders in wagons other than the two capable drivers.
- 5. All cart classes must have a capable handler inside ring.
- 6. Stall fees are \$ 8.00 per day or \$ 16.00 for the weekend in the barn. Line Horses will be allowed in the barn only if space is available on Saturday and Sunday. Only those stall reservations made through the Carp Fair Office and submitted with the entry forms, will be honoured on a first come basis. Stall Fees will be waived if exhibitor registration is

complete and received by the Fair office on or before Sept 1st 2023.

- 7. Ring numbers will be available from the Directors in the center ring announcers booth in the Heavy Horse Ring.

The responsibility of proof of separation of breeding units shall rest with the exhibitor(s).

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IMPORTANT TO EXHIBITORS:

- Articles entered in any Class (1 45) must not be entered in the Specials Classes (100 - 111). Exhibitors must use containers which are suitable and not upset easily. Professional exhibitors are prohibited from entering any classes.
- 2. All flowers and blooms exhibited must be grown by the exhibitor.
- 3. No purchased, plastic or silk flowers may be used.

HINTS FOR THE EXHIBITORS IN THIS SECTION:

- 1. All exhibits should be arranged attractively.
- 2. Cut flowers are to be shown on long stems and where possible, with foliage.
- For taller stems and larger containers, use of cedar is recommended to hold stems in place.

- 4. Cedar used as a filler should not show above the container level.
- 5. Flowers should be as uniform as possible.
- Make sure to measure the diameter of the blooms and enter the proper size by class.
- 7. A spray is a portion of a plant with a number of flowers.
- 8. A stem is a plant structure carrying one or more flowers and/or buds.
- 9. A bloom is an individual flower, one to a stem.
- 10. If a bud is not opened and not showing any colour, it does not count as a bloom and it is a good idea to remove it.
- 11. Exhibits must contain the exact number of flowers specified for the class.
- 12. Do not leave seed heads on the exhibit.
- 13. Watch for wilted petals.
- 14. Remove debris from pot.
- 15. In dahlia classes, green centers should not be showing and the blooms should be at approx. a 45 degree angle from the stem.
- 16. Ideal gladiolus spikes should show 1/3 open, 1/3 bud and 1/3 green.
- 17. A snapdragon may have more than 1 spike; note what is specified for the class.
- 18. African violets should contain only a single crown in a pot.
- 19. Sedum light and dark classes are differentiated by colour of stem
